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AC 1.2. - The 5 Pathways to Nature Connection are:

- Senses explore with senses.
- Beauty take time to appreciate the beauty of nature.
- Meaning Consider what nature means to you.
- Emotion- find an emotional bond with nature.
- Compassion Think what you could do for nature.

Consider specific outdoor activities and how in particular they support a nature connection.

- Planting pollinator plants
- Adding bird and/or bat boxes
- Creating habitats
